Beyak sweeps four contests with Suburban Newspapers of America win

Competing against North American newspapers from New York and Toronto, to Chicago and Los Angeles, *Abbotsford News* reporter Trudy Beyak has won first place for environmental writing in the prestigious Suburban Newspapers of America (SNA) editorial contest.

The win marks an unprecedented sweep of four different environmental contests for Beyak with her

Beyak's SNA award is for a series of stories subsequent to the four-page SE2 Power Struggle fea-ture that focus on the power plant parade proposed in Washington state and the gas lines leading to the Sumas hub at the southern end of Whatcom Road.

The SNA includes 2,000 suburban newspapers in North America. Their member newspapers reach more than 17 million households and more than 42 million readers throughout the United States and Canada.

"Trudy's tenacity and her ability to dig deeply into a story are true assets for our newsroom," said Abbotsford News editor Rick Rake.

"Trudy is stubborn and will not take 'No' for an answer when information sources throw up unneces sary roadblocks. She cares dearly about the community she is reporting on."
